Jesus walked with us as we supported the arts in worship, discovered our spiritual gifts, and explored new styles of worship and music as we gave praise to God.



As more and more congregations face the realities of declining numbers, an aging membership, and a shrinking pool of lay leaders, there's a growing realization that some things will have to change if we are to survive. Determining how best to move forward isn't easy, and the task of finding ways to honour existing traditions and practices while making room for new and innovative initiatives can be tricky. But I'm heartened and impressed by the way you at Humber Valley have followed the lead of Sarah and Abram and have embarked on a journey to a new future. And, over these last months, much has been accomplished:

- We have sought to discern what God is up to in this neighborhood, outside the walls of our beautiful building.
- We have turned our attention to what God has been up to in our own congregation, and to services and times of fellowship when Christ's grace and love have spoken to us through prayer, music and word.
- We have been educating ourselves about how other congregations have worked to find new energy, purpose and life.
- We have taken some bold new steps to restructure the way we make decisions, and have developed a new governance structure that will help us improve communications and focus more intently on new strategic initiatives.
- We have explored, under Rev. Rick's leadership, and Jill's musical direction, some new styles of worship and a diverse range of musical traditions.
- We have gathered to celebrate special occasions, and to discern where God is leading us.
- And we have done so much more ... as can be seen in the reports that follow.

Our Iceberg Is Melting

In the bleakness of mid-January 2018, Humber Valley United Church was still reeling from the abrupt and unexpected departure of Rev. Mark Winger.

At our January Leadership Council meeting, Ron Crago brought to our attention a book by John Kotter, a Harvard professor and expert in change management. "Our Iceberg is Melting" is a fable about penguins that are faced with a crisis and have to change.

From that inspiration, a miracle grew. With Professor Kotter's permission, Joan Belford transformed his book into a musical play, complete with appropriate lyrics set to familiar tunes. George Turnbull codirected, created stunning video segments, played a key character, and taught the penguins to shake their feathers in a disco dance.

We held no auditions, but offered at least one line to anyone who wanted to participate. 37 members of the congregation, from age 10 to 91, volunteered to be penguins, and another 29 helped build sets or operate lights or run cameras.

The whole congregation got involved. Gentlemen lent us tuxedos, and ladies made us red bow ties. People stepped up to arrange food, tickets, and all the other logistics. Lorraine Persaud turned the dining tables into shimmering icebergs. When our mascot penguin Peter White became ill, people came from every direction to fill his shoes. The soloists also pitched in: Rob Kempson directed staging, Devin Herbert was a narrator, Joni Henson made us cry with her solo, and Jill Filion taught us how to walk like penguins.

We timed the event early and kept the prices low, so that as many people as possible could attend. We sold out. Cont'd

The event began with wine and penguin crackers at 4:30, followed by the play at 5:15. Although cast members were very nervous, the production surpassed all expectations. The audience loved it.

At show's end, the penguins led the audience to Steed Hall for a pasta dinner. At each table, a member of Council who had read Professor Kotter's book helped steer the discussion to Kotter's change management principles. We ended with a successful live auction emceed by the hilarious Michael and Allan Orr. It was a wonderful evening that blanketed all present with a warm spirit that has persisted to this day. Rev. Rick Tamas was a big factor in our success. Not only did he act in the play and promote it from the lectern, he reinforced the key lessons of the production in his sermon the day after.

Working on the "Penguin" production accomplished many things: It galvanized the church community in a positive activity; It brought forth hidden talents and capacities; It lifted our sprits; and it proved that when we work together, we can move icebergs.



Transition Team 2018 - March 2019 *Constance Crosby, Chair*

We entered 2018 after a tumultuous review by the United Church of our then minister Rev. Winger and of our congregation. At that time Rev. Tamas was doing supply ministry work with us and he took on the difficult job of short-term supply Minister in this trying period until an Intentional Interim Minister could be appointed. The terms of the November 2017 Conference decision required HVUC to appoint a specially-trained Intentional Interim Minister.



In early 2018, the Transition Team was struck by the HVUC Leadership Council and approved by Conference. The team set about its work with the first job to facilitate finding an engaging and qualified Intentional Interim Minister. Out of this process we found Rev. Dr. Ian Manson. HVUC appointed Rev. Ian and Rev. Rick on a team basis for a two-year period, expiring May 1st, 2020, each having separate spheres of focus.

The work of the Transition Team is to support the

Ministers and the Leadership Council during the transition period to complete the work assigned by Conference. We can summarize these under the headings of Healing, Governance and Visioning. The Ministers worked hard and assisted greatly in the healing process. The Transition Team tackled Governance with good speed and togetherness with the Congregation. We are now in the Visioning phase, and looking forward to what we will do for the next few years. We started with visits to churches that are sustaining themselves or growing.

We were encouraged by the great participation of the congregation. We learned a lot and came back inspired. We shared our learnings with the congregation at a standing-room-only meeting in February. Soon, we will reconvene to discuss the shared visioning and next steps. Upcoming vision sessions are set to do that – April 14th, May 5th (at AGM), and June 9th. We encourage you to speak out and respectfully share your views – where you agree as well as where you disagree. It is only by being transparent that we can get to a shared vision and successfully transition to the next phase.

When Paul Dewar (former Ottawa MP) was diagnosed with incurable brain cancer in early 2018, he was advised to 'face death and walk back into life.' In a subsequent CBC interview he described a crisis as a 'change,' a turning point, and genuinely referred to his illness as a 'gift.'

It's a story that causes me to think of the manner in which Humber Valley United Church (HVUC) has truly taken the 'walk back into life' in 2018.

It is my pleasure to report on the part the elders have contributed to our church renewal.

Usually the main theme of discussion at the Elder's meeting is connecting and communicating with members and adherents. Many folks now read *Connections* online and feel less of a need for an Elder visit or contact. Then there are those who do not have a computer and naturally your Elder wants to ensure you are up-to-date on church activities and news. Sometimes there is a resistance to an Elder's visit or contact. The objective is to strike the correct balance and comfortable touch points for everyone. Feedback to your Elder is important for both parties and for HVUC.

The new governance structure was the second area of focus in our discussions this year. New to the Official Board this year will be 4 Members-at-Large (MAL). As the Elder role evolves they will be encouraged and will also be considering members of their flock to become involved in leadership roles working with the MAL on short-term projects and strategic planning. Renewal requires involvement. Make it fun and joyful, something you feel good doing.

The third main discussion point resulted in a change to the serving of Communion. Due to concerns of transmitting colds and flu via intincture, we are now using recyclable plastic cups. From all of HVUC I extend a special thanks to Sharon Dowdall, Joanne Moilliet and Sally Roper who have stepped down from their Elder role. These three ladies have served as Elders for a lengthy time in addition to fulfilling many additional responsibilities at HVUC. We are most grateful for your contributions.

New Elders are always needed and welcome. It is my pleasure to welcome Joan Rayner as a returning Elder.

And, to all Elders, thank you. You show up, you participate with ideas, enthusiasm and joy. Your involvement is encouraging and energizing. In addition, so many of you are involved in and responsible for multiple activities at HV. Thank you.

Finally, to Rev. Dr. Rick Tamas and Rev. Dr. Ian Manson, thank you. Words are insufficient. You are a blessing to all of us at HVUC.

As we lift each other up, I count my blessings.

Music Ministry

Jill Diane Filion, Director of Music

It has been my great pleasure to assume the Director of Music position for the past 10 months. I am very grateful to the support and help from the HVUC staff, choir and handbell ensemble and congregation. The opportunity to grow as a musician and leader is much appreciated.

In 2018 I introduced Angel Voices, an opportunity for children to sing together and take part in the church services. The upright piano from the music room was moved to the chancel and fitted with dollies so that it can be easily maneuvered. This has proved valuable for both choir rehearsals and presentations as well as facilitating a better arrangement for the handbell ensemble presentations. The Grand Piano's damp system has been connected which has reduced the number of piano tunings.

There was no budget for a concert last year, but the Chancel Choir and soloists were invited to sing with the Ontario Pops orchestra in December. For 2019 I have planned two "in house" concerts: April 27th "What Would We do Without Music?" and December 8th "Festive Follies." These will both be augmented by fundraising events, which, combined with ticket sales, will cover the cost of soloists and raise money for the church.

I have also undertaken organ lessons, 12 of which have been generously sponsored by the church. My teacher is John Derksen , an inspiring, patient and kind mentor! As Director of Music, I thought it important that I be able to provide some organ accompaniment as well as piano. It is a complex instrument and I have a new respect for organists.

I continue to be completely devoted to providing music which inspires and complements worship. I am always interested in positive feedback and constructive criticism.



Our services continued to be inspired with dramatic readings and the dramatization of Biblical messages, liturgical dance, animated children's stories and the use of audio-visual support materials.

Our Sunday School and youth programs have continued to grow, with Sunday School beginning in the Fall of 2018. Small group devotionals also continued in 2018 including the Wednesday evening educational series, Jesus and Java, and Week of Guided Prayer. Kaleidoscope devotionals continued to be included in all Leadership Council and Committee meetings. These have been welcomed by most as they set the tone for our ministries both within the church and in the community.

Through our Worship experiences, HVUC is striving to "worship God in a spirit of joy," and to "share the good news of Jesus Christ." This continued throughout 2018 through inspirational traditional and non-traditional services, small group educational sessions, and through the Sunday School and youth programming.

In 2019, our services will focus on inspiring and building faith, healing, transformation and transition. We will be adding Bible Study programming as well as a Confirmation Class in 2019. We hope to grow the children's choir (Angel Voices) and also the Chancel Choir. We ask for your patience during this time of liturgical evolution and experimentation and invite your comments and suggestions. We also welcome all to join the Worship and Music team to ensure you have a voice in the planning of worship experiences. As always, our hope is to continue to offer worship experiences that bring us closer to the "One from Whom all Blessings Flow."

- Connections was published four times during the year under the leadership/editorship of Susanne Hynes.
- We provided support to the baby showers held this year for Licia Bryden and Claire Hatje.
- We organized the Pancake Supper with the youth on February 13, 2018.
- We provided support to the Passover Seder Potluck on March 29, 2018.
- We provided hospitality support before and a dinner after the presentation of "Our Iceberg is Melting" on April 21, 2018.
- We organized the lunch held during the Annual Meeting on May 13, 2018.

- We organized the goodies for the reception held as part of the Tree Lighting and Community Caroling event on December 9, 2018 and before the Christmas Eve Service.
- We provided goodies after the benefit concert, "A Child's Christmas in Wales," on December 15, 2018.
- We provided lunches at congregational meetings.
- David Dallimore took the initiative to establish an award in Fred Van der Vliet's name aimed at individuals who have blessed our church with creativity and innovation. This was presented for the fifth time in 2018 to Lorraine Pearsall and Lynn Manning for their unwavering service to the church.

On-line communication continues to be a very important part of our Ministry. We send out weekly e-blasts to inform congregants about what is happening in our church life. Special eblasts are sent when somebody dies and also to convey important updates. We try to keep the website current and constantly evolving. This platform is vital in providing information to anyone who wishes to learn about HVCU. The contact page is a way for people to easily place an inquiry or send a note. Social media is used to promote Church events and to share information with congregants and the public.

Printed bulletins (Mini-Connections) containing the order of service plus notices and events are distributed by Ushers on Sundays as people enter the Sanctuary. A newsletter (*Connections*) is published quarterly, containing stories, articles, reports and photos submitted by its readers. Posters are created and posted in the church and around the community to advertise our community events.

HVUC is fortunate to have a state-of-the-art AV system, which provides high quality sound for church services and concerts. Slides are prepared every Sunday and projected onto screens with the order of service including lyrics for hymns and announcements.

In 2001, immediately after the tragedy of 9/11, our Church Board approved the formation of a committee to be called, "Issues and Us." Its purpose is to invite speakers to come to the church to make presentations and lead discussions that focus on local issues and issues relevant to the congregation. This team works to organize presentations by speakers on topics of interest to the congregation and community.

One event was held with a focus on "Leaving a Legacy in 2018." The guest speaker was Sarah Charters from the United Church of Canada Foundation.

In 2019, speakers are being lined up related to becoming an Affirming Church. This team may also try to jointly organize events with Eglinton St. George's United Church, as they have a similar group, where each church would have the same speaker who speaks at a noon event at Eglinton St. George's and at an afternoon event at HVUC. Connections supports the congregational life of Humber Valley United Church by sharing stories, events, thoughtful articles, reports, and photographs submitted by its readers. Each issue features a reflection by our minister and original articles, prayers, and poems by HVUC people. *Connections* is typically between 20 and 28 pages long and has developed into more of a magazine than a newsletter, thanks to the wonderful items submitted by congregants. Thank you, thank you dear contributors for making this newsletter such a vital reflection of the spiritual and social life of HVUC.

Connections is distributed in print by HVUC elders, available on the HVUC website under the Connect tab, and emailed as a link in the church's e-Blast. It is published by the Church and most of the costs of production are defrayed by revenue from ads placed by our sponsors.

2018 was a year of transitions at Humber Valley United and the four editions we published reported on and supported these transitions. We published articles about staff members who have moved on and about our new Ministry Team as well as many items about the new governance model being developed for our church. Each edition also contained financial statements and a report by the chair of the Stewardship and Finance Committee. With an amount from Capital Outreach, money donated in the last capital campaign, projects were chosen for support. Individual members of the congregation gave freely to many of these charities as well.


The projects supported in 2018 were:


The SF Committee is responsible for ensuring that HVUC is able to fund its financial obligations to our staff, to the maintenance of our cherished building, to the wider United Church and to the community we serve.

Commentary

To no one's surprise, 2018 was a challenging year financially, as well as operationally. On the positive side, congregational givings remained strong. However, they were offset by increased payroll expenses as a result of the changes to our ministerial leadership. The net result was an operating deficit of nearly \$94,000 (See the appended financial statement for further details). The deficit was partially covered by contributions from the Trustees and from the Humber Valley Foundation. The balance was funded by a transfer from the capital campaign account.

Our primary goal for the coming year is to help the Leadership Council to manage both income and expenses in such a way as to reduce the operating deficit to a more manageable (and sustainable) level of around \$15,000. With God's help and your support, we believe that this is achievable. Thank you to all of our congregants for your ongoing contributions of time, talent, and money.

There is a light at the end of the tunnel.



Property Committee

The responsibility of the Committee is to maintain the exterior and interior of our 67-year-old building and property in good repair and appearance, especially with over 40 community groups using our facilities. We manage physical changes, improvements and any capital projects.

This Committee meets formally 3-4 times/year, but members have many interactions for specific situations.

2018 ACTIVITIES:

1) Completed paving of parking lot up to church walls

2) Upgrade and repairs to audio-visual system

3) Installed safety rail for gallery

4) Obtained and managed re-sizing, re-finishing and installation of 8 new exterior doors

5) Repaired and re-wired 2 large ceiling light fixtures inside main front doors


6) Removed old freezer, then transported and installed new large refrigerator donated by Sally Jo Martin

7) Our Property Manager and Sextons maintained cleanliness of all rooms, along with innumerable "set -ups and take-downs" of chairs and equipment for many church renters.

2019 PROJECTS (PLANNED)

- ROOF May have to re-shingle entire eastfacing roof (\$45,000) plus
- SANCTUARY -"Artfully" replace coloured glass pieces that have fallen from stained glass windows
- Develop options and costs for air conditioning
- Develop options and costs to possibly remove pews, refinish floor, and acquire 400 new chairs

- DOORS Repair and upgrade exterior door to Montessori School
- WINDOWS -Install plastic or glass panels on all south facing coloured windows to increase insulation.
- ELEVATOR Assess cost and feasibility of converting elevator doors from existing temperamental automatic to manual operation
- WASHROOMS Develop plan for major improvements and greater capacity of main floor washrooms.



Trustees

Alan Orr, Chair

The Board of Trustees of HVUC is responsible for the safe and secure administration of all church assets and property. This means that we ensure that all church facilities and buildings are adequately insured, are in good condition, are well maintained, and used for appropriate purposes. We also manage general and specific restricted funds belonging to the congregation.

As at December 31st, 2018, the Trustees had \$816,937 under administration, with the money held in three funds.

General and Specific Fund

\$93,795 for loans and expenses judged to be relevant to enhancing the interests and well-being of HVUC. During 2018, the Trustees approved a special transfer of \$15,000 from this fund to the church. This transfer accounts for most of the decrease from the 2017 balance of \$109,960.

Capital Fund

\$90,954 is the fund held as part of the 2012 campaign "60 and Beyond." This money is to be held while the Board decides on its application. Funds raised to Dec 31, 2012 (\$235,000) were transferred to the Trustees to be invested and held for the church's use. During 2013 and 2014, \$33,000 and \$100,000 of such funds were transferred back to the church. During 2016, additional money WAS transferred into this fund accounting for most of the increase of \$90,218. During 2018, the trustees transferred \$125,000 from this fund to support the operations of the church. This transfer accounts for the entire decrease from the 2017 balance of \$214,021.

Manse Capital Fund

\$632,188 and is restricted so that the principle is held in trust, and all related investment income is used solely to augment/support HVUC ministerial costs. These activities allowed the Trustees to contribute \$19,861 in 2018 to cover ministerial costs.

The Trustees maintain an Investment Committee to manage and oversee our investments, particularly the Manse Capital Fund.
